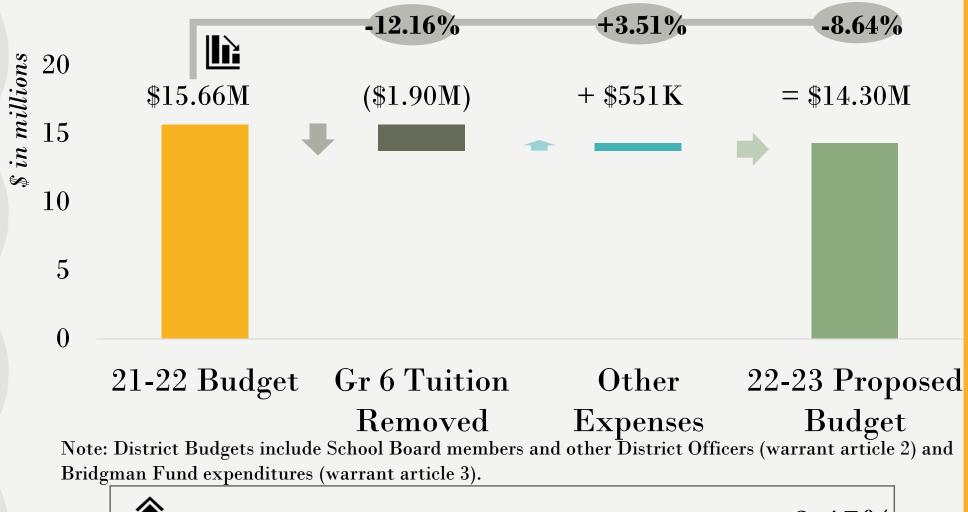

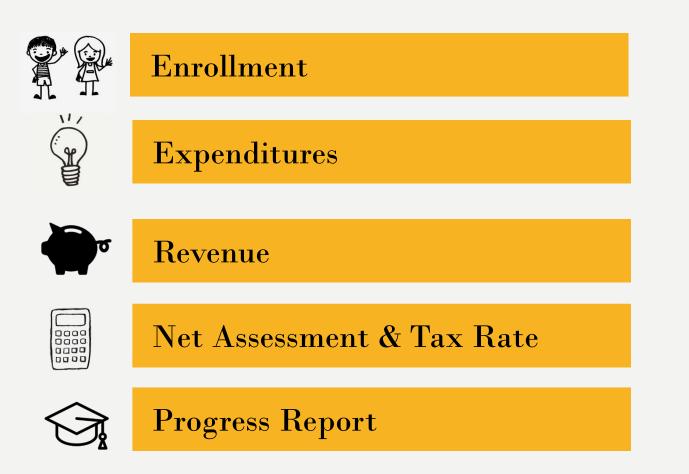

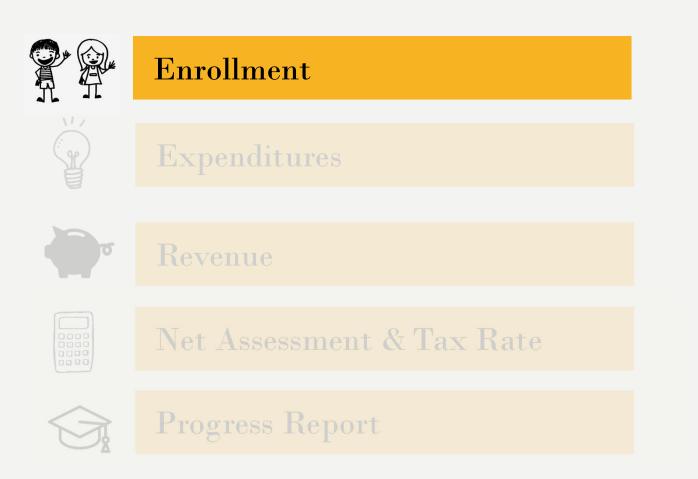
Projected Hanover Education Tax Rate (<u>All-in</u>)*: + 3.47%

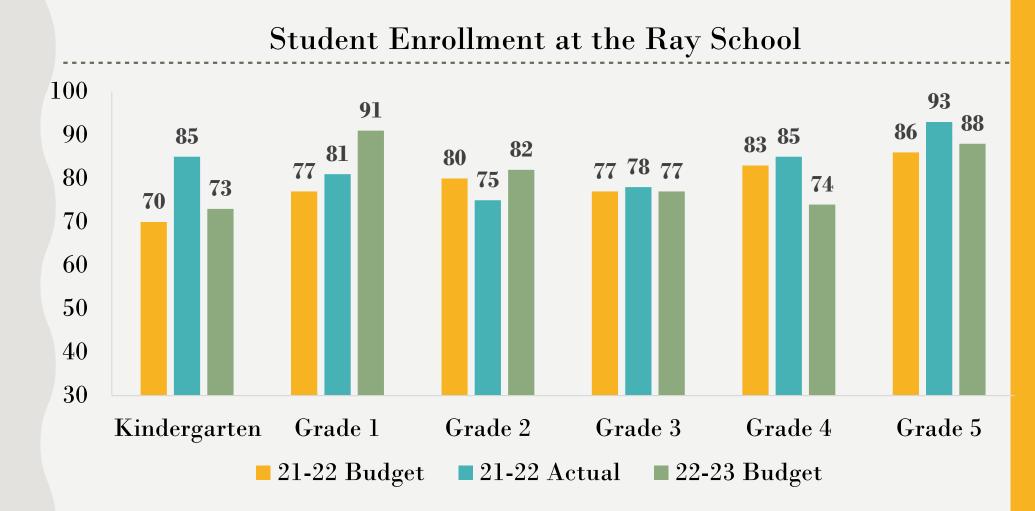








Expected K - Grade 5 enrollment is 13 students higher than current year's budget

2022-23 Revenue sources, excluding new local property taxes (net assessment)

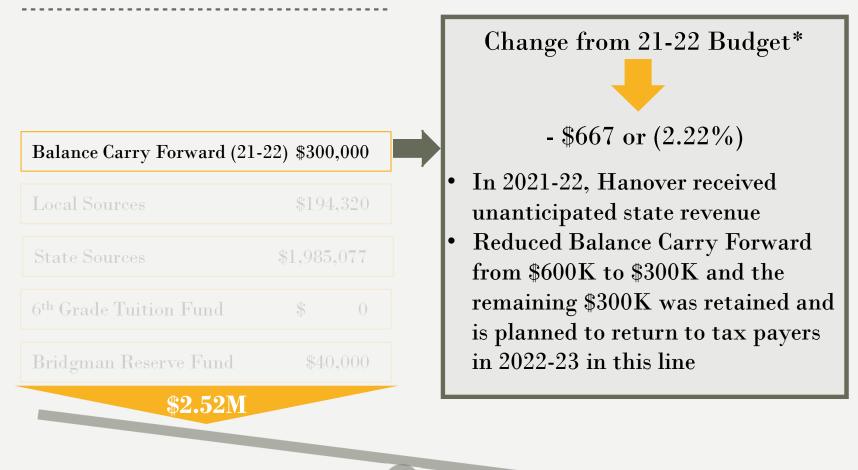

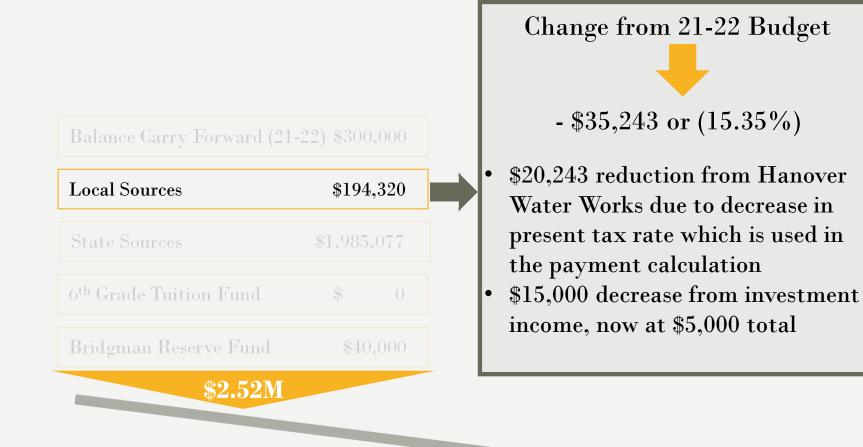

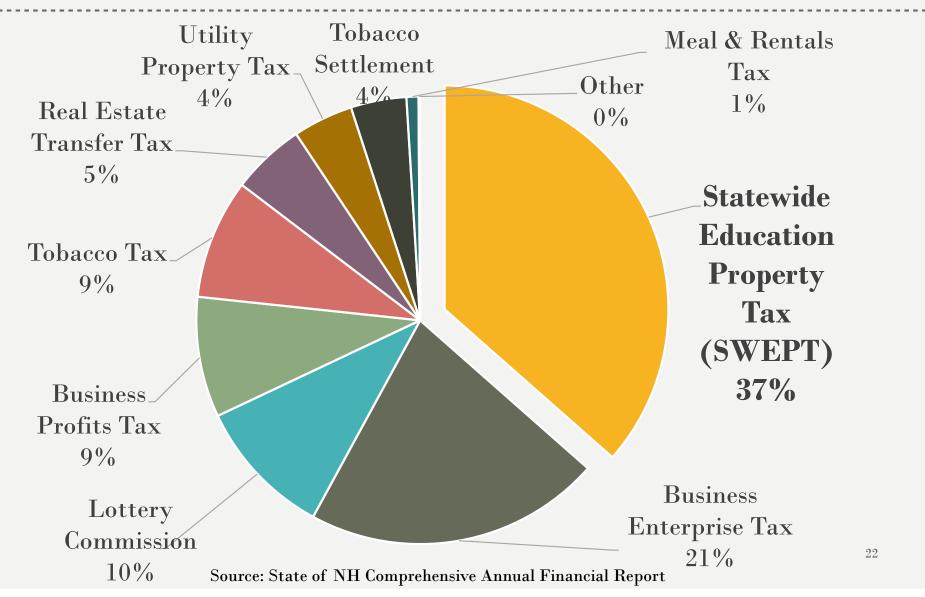

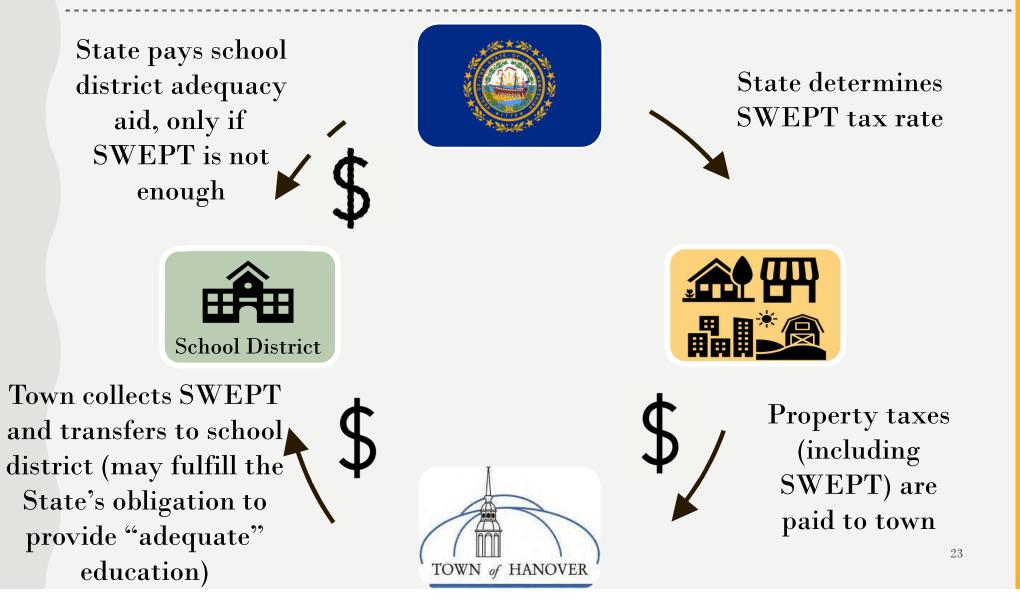
SWEPT is one of many revenue sources for the NH State Education Trust Fund

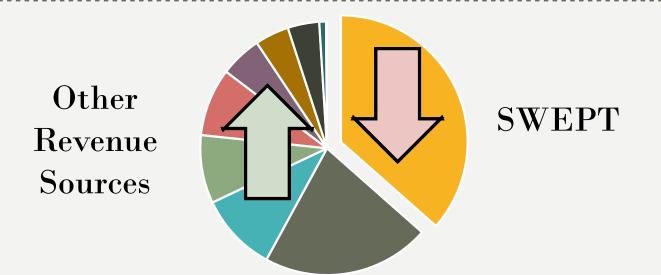

For <u>one year</u>, NH State decided to cut the SWEPT tax rate by \$100 million to <u>\$1.28</u> per \$1,000 of property value

AND

Pay school districts a one-time "hold harmless" Adequacy Aid grant (from the other revenue sources)

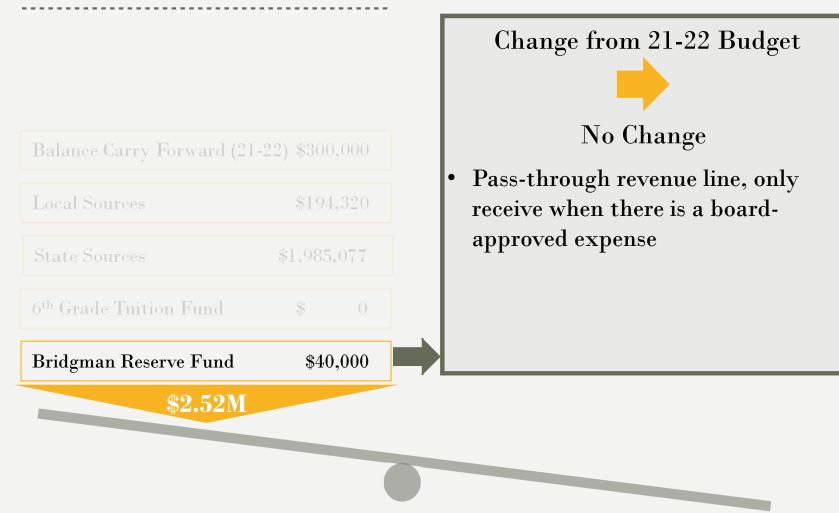

- Currently, there is ~\$379K in the 6th Grade Tuition reserve fund

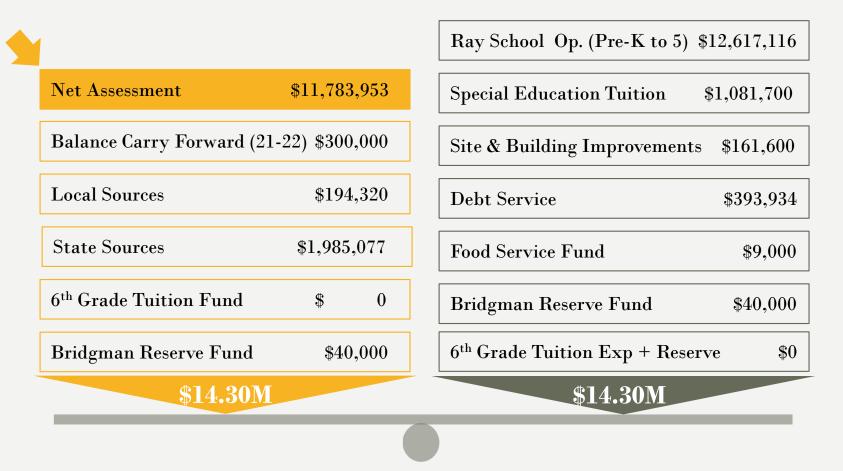

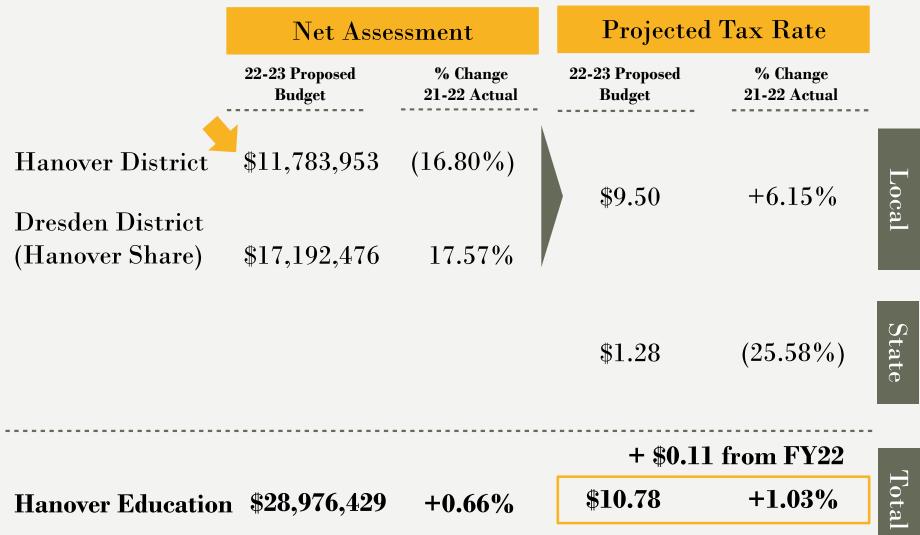

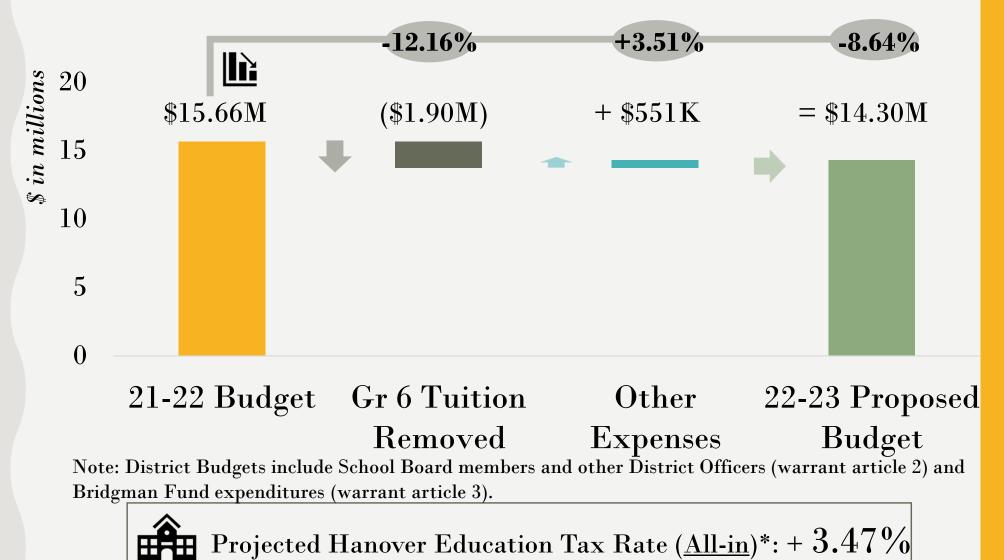

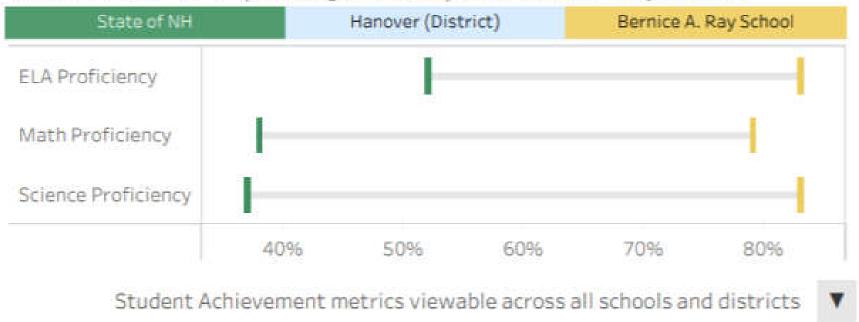

Proficiency as compared with the district (including all schools in the district) as well as the state of NH (including all schools) across all three subject areas.



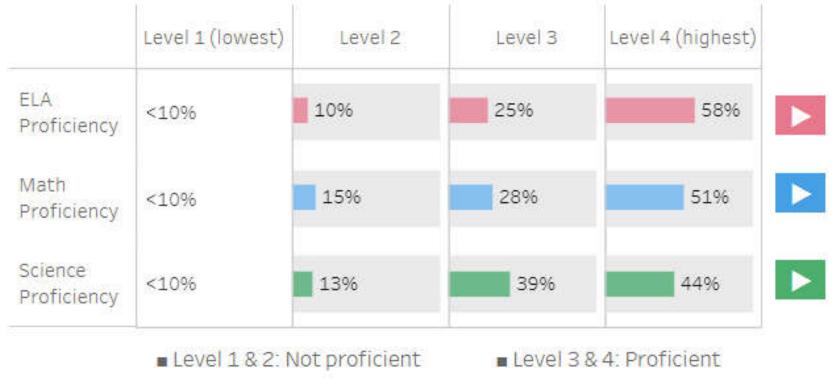

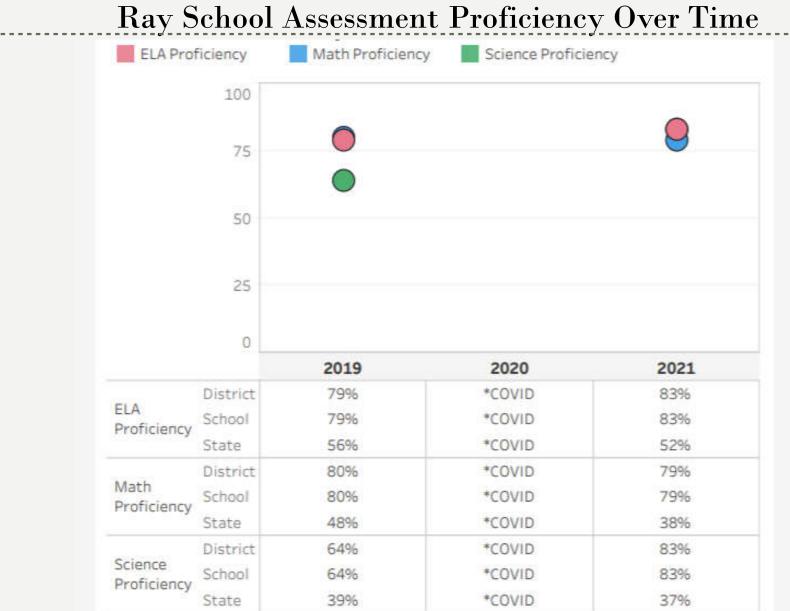
2021 Ray Student Achievement Levels
