Reductions to HHS 19/20 Proposed Budget

The 19/20 Hanover High School budget contains additional staffing and resources to create a program we are calling Response to Need (RTN). The cuts outlined below, although somewhat reducing the RTN proposal, do keep the core elements of the program intact. Our school, like others across our states and the nation, is seeing increases in absenteeism and other negative learning outcomes stemming from anxiety, depression, concussions and other acute life challenges. We feel it's imperative we address these needs and, therefore, have chosen to make reductions in other areas rather than eliminate the entire RTN proposal. It's also worth noting that earlier phases of the budget preparation process cut requests for: a second assistant principal, a sustainability curriculum development position, fractional FTE's as well as other programmatic increases.

The following are proposed reductions to the HHS budget as requested by the DSB as the 1/8/19 meeting:
